USDOE, ETA grants WIOA funding to the state eligible agency (SEA), DEIR in NY, which coordinates workforce development activities and resources through the state's One-Stop Workforce System. DEIR administers WIOA Title I funding to the two (2) local workforce areas through (LWDBs, designated by the Governor). | WIOA, Title I, Dislocated Worker (DW) | This program is designed to help workers get back to work as quickly as possible and overcome barriers to employment. When individuals become dislocated workers as a result of job loss, mass layoffs, plant trade closures, or transition to economic sectors, the Dislocated Worker program provides services to assist them in re-entering the workforce. Services for dislocated workers are integrated and provided through national network of American Job Centers (AJCs). The formula will use the most appropriate data available. Weighting a factor more is not permitted unless a formula is provided in an approved State Plan. | WIOA, Title I, Youth | A comprehensive youth employment program for serving eligible youth, ages 14-24, who face barriers to education, training, and employment. Funds for youth services are allocated to states and local areas based on a formula. The WIOA Youth Program focuses primarily on out-of-school youth, requiring local areas to expend a minimum of 75% of WIOA youth funds on them. | National Dislocated Worker Grants (NDWCG), Disaster Recovery and Employment Recovery | National Dislocated Worker Grants (NDWCG) are discretionary grants awarded by the Secretary of Labor under Section 170 of the Workforce Investment and Opportunity Act (WIOA) to provide employment and related services for dislocated workers. Employment Recovery (ER) grants support capacity to serve dislocated workers and to meet the increased demand for employment and training services following a qualifying event. Qualifying events include major economic dislocations, such as plant closures, mass layoffs, or higher than average demand for employment and training services for dislocated members of the Armed Forces and their spouses.
